SUBMISSION OF MANUSCRIPTS

The ICEB Editorial Board invites submissions of manuscripts (three thousand words) on topics relating to research and exploration of work with institutionalised children, and children in alternate care. Manuscripts must be original, without any prior publication and must be submitted in English. The manuscripts will be subjected to a peer-review process. The Editorial Board takes the final decision on publications and reserves the right to edit the final manuscript. The members of the Editorial Board will give notification of acceptance, rejection or the need for revision. The eighth issue of the ICEB Journal is ready to be released at the 3rd BICON on March 16, 2018. We are entering into our 5th year and are inviting manuscripts for the next issue, which is the 2nd issue of Volume 5. It will come out in September, 2018, and is a Special Edition on Aftercare. Manuscripts not included in the next edition can still be published in the subsequent editions of the ICEB journal, if the Editorial Board so decides.

CONTENT OF THE ICEB JOURNAL

The Journal “Institutionalised Children Explorations and Beyond”, an initiative of Udayan Care is now in its **fifth year of publication**. As an academic journal, ICEB addresses concerns around Alternative Care for children and youth and also serves as a forum for sharing studies, discussions, debates, discussions and research on such issues. ICEB seeks to appraise, evaluate, and commission research and studies that impact and have bearing on the lives of children, who are in any form of Alternative Care with a focus on South Asian countries. ICEB is published twice every year; the first issue comes out in March and the second one in September each year.

This issue is a **Special Edition focusing on “Aftercare”** and looks at research articles and papers that highlight this critical period during the young adult’s life when he or she steps out of the child care institution into living life as an independent adult. This issue of ICEB calls for a discussion of the considerations that need to be taken into account to ensure the well-being of the young adult during this period of development. A discussion on the measures that can be implemented during aftercare is also invited. Papers emphasizing the need for aftercare, where it is not provided, are also welcome. Research and case studies on aftercare will fruitfully inform policy making in relation to youth availing aftercare, especially since aftercare has come into particular focus now, in India as well as in other countries in the South Asian region.

Like every issue, the key **highlights** of this issue too shall be as follows:

- **Editorial Note**
- **In-depth interview** of an individual who has done a prominent work on Alternative Care
- **Unpublished Manuscripts** from individuals or organisations, who have conduct research with orphaned, abandoned and at-risk children.
- Papers with significant **international perspective**, solicited from authors outside the South Asia
- Article presenting '**good practice**' to provide a comprehensive review in different settings
- Reviews of **books and movies**, revolving around relevant issues of child and youth care.
- **Brief communications**, which consist of briefings on a particular topic, whether it is a new law, new policy, new practice, any review of any conference, seminar, workshop, or anything relevant to the particular topic.
- **Upcoming Events** that share and capture information on upcoming events on the issue.

YOU can contribute - This call for papers is an invitation to all academics from social science, child and youth development experts, practitioners, managers, researchers, policy makers, young student, research scholars and activists having experience of child and youth care systems.

Submissions should critically examine and analyse the situation of children in Alternative Care as well as reflect on the social norms and practices prevalent in different nations. Contributions should document the current debates and policy framework around this issue of child and youth care, be reflective in nature and cover the key dilemmas that protect or fail to protect and uphold rights of children in Alternative Care.

Please follow the below **Contributor Guidelines** closely before submitting abstracts and full papers:

- Abstracts must be original, without any prior publication
- All contributions should be in English only
- All contributions should be in the best interest of child rights and show respect for their rights
- All contributions must follow the APA guidelines (see at <http://www.apastyle.org/>)
- Spelling must be consistent within an article and use British English whereas spelling in references should follow the original
- All contributions should be carefully proof-read before submission
- **The Editorial Board** reserve the right to reject without review poorly proofed articles with errors
- **The Editorial Board** takes the final decision on publications and edit the final manuscript.
- All contributions based on research should comply with ethical principles and appropriate ethical procedures
- Contributions must be word processed, preferably using Microsoft Word.
- All contributions should be submitted in word format, using times roman font size 12 and mention title of article / paper, authors' names and affiliations, brief biographical details, corresponding author's contact details, four keywords and an abstract
