The life of a child is like a sailing ship. It has its sunny days, starry skies and rainy nights. But there are many children who have to face the thunderstorms and turbulence all by themselves. They get strayed in the darkness and might not be able to trace their way back to the shore. They have no one to look up to, no pole star to guide them.

Although they have no guiding star, their ship must sail. All they need is a shore. A place where they can heal the damage.

Since 1994, Udayan Care has been taking various initiatives to recover these children from the darkness of desertion and provide them with anchors.

The orphaned, abandoned, at-risk children find the shore at Udayan Ghar, a shore where these homeless children can find the care they need to sail their ship magnificently. Here they can rest, grow and develop in a compassionate environment. Long term volunteers form a group of Mentors who guide the children as lighthouse and become a part of the children's growth and development.

The young adults who come out of the care system are then guided by the Aftercare programme, where they are provided with secure homes, financial support and everything they need to continue an independent life.

To ensure an unhindered journey and a smooth sail, for the girls and youth coming from difficult circumstances, Udayan Shalini Fellowship and Pragnya Fellowship provide them resources to learn from, and hand hold through a unique mentoring programme.

Learning to build the ship and sailing it through rough and smooth tides alike is a matter of skill. To build a strong ship is something no one can avoid. Under our various programme, like the Udayan Care Information Technology and Udayan Care Skill Development Centres, the other underserved children and youth learn to equip themselves to build a stronger ship.

Every child and youth has the right to have a shelter, be loved and cared for, and have education, and opportunities to develop skills, to have someone who would stand with them, especially when they are stranded and bewildered, and are vulnerable.

This vulnerability can harm them. They need to be rescued, recovered and protected.

Through our various programmes, we not only help them gain skills to build their ships, but maintain our ties with the young adults coming out of our programmes to keep track of their sailing ships.

Udayan Care was founded in 1994 with the belief that Out-of-Home-Care children, if placed in family environment and not in orphanages, can repair their ruptured attachments and develop into wholesome, well-adjusted youth; girls and young people from underserved communities can do wonders if given education, skills and personalized mentoring. The last year has seen successful implementation and expansion of all our programmes; the depth of interventions at every step of their journey empowered our youth to attain their goals.

Over the last few years, Udayan Care has been able to establish itself as an organisation committed towards rights of children including child protection and child education, especially for girls. 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
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



- Issues of comprehensive mental health care and trauma informed care approach for the emotional well-being of children living in Alternative Care is missing in action.
- A robust mechanism for Aftercare services to support young adults who exit out of child care institutions on turning 18 years of age is almost non-existent.
- Institutional Care in practise it is still the most common and far most often the first choice resorted to by the gatekeeping agencies of juvenile justice in India, which is the Child Welfare Committees (CWC).
- There is dearth of evidence based studies and data available on the number of children living in Alternative Care worldwide and specially in South Asia.

* Children living in OHC settings refers to all children not in the care and protection of their biological parents for a variety of reason and under different circumstances.


Providing loving homes to at-risk children and nurturing them in a warm family environment



Udayan Care believes that a loving home and family is the right of every child. Udayan Ghars are long-term homes that nurture children, who are orphaned, abandoned or at risk, in a compassionate and comfortable atmosphere through a strategy called L.I.F.E : Living In Family Environment.

There are single and multi-unit 13 Udayan Ghars, wherein 12 children (6-18 years) constitute a unit to give individual attention to each child. This 'Group Care' model ensures that children are loved and cared by a group of Mentor Parents, who are long term volunteers, and have functions of parents; with the help of a team of social workers, resident care givers and mental health professionals. Udayan Ghars are located in middle class neighborhoods to help children reintegrate with mainstream society.


Children receive quality education in some of the best schools. Once they reach the age of 18 years, they move into our Aftercare Programme and continue with higher education or vocational training.

THE GHAR TEAM

A child in a regular family structure is brought up amidst continuous love, care and affection since birth, not just from their immediate but also extended family. The society is conditioned to look at these children as "normal" and instinctively treat them with recognition, thus helping the children reach their full potential. Children coming in Udayan Ghars come from difficult circumstances; they are the survivors, who have developed behavior practices, which have helped them survive in the conditions they were, which the other children of their age do not encounter.

The common thing in all these children is the scars inflicted by poverty and social apathy. The experienced team of Udayan Ghar works consistently and continuously on each and every child, so that their individual social functioning, physical and mental well-being can be enhanced and they can be made productive citizens of the country, who are able to contribute to the society. The Ghar Team works on long term relationships, consistent living circumstances and capacitybuilding opportunities. In addition to the philanthropy of citizens from varied fields across the globe.



The Udayan Ghar Carer team consists of :

CARE GIVERS & SUPERVISORS

Dedicated, sensitive caregivers stay with the children 24x7. They help in all household chores and daily care, while addressing issues of safety, security, personal hygiene, nutrition, immediate medical care, and managing some bit of documentation.

MENTOR PARENTS

To enable a family environment for children at Udayan Ghars and to take forward a sense of permanency and stability, engagement of individuals who willingly give their time, skill, resources and love, was and continues to be vital to the Udayan Ghar model. Mentor Parents, a concept unique to Udayan Ghars, are the long-term committed volunteers, who have the experience of raising their own children. Ideally 3-5 in one Ghar, they have functions of a parent - to nurture the children, bring in them a sense of continuity and stability, form strong family bonds, provide opportunities for education, talent, leisure and outings as well as manage finances of the home.

SOCIAL WORKERS

Young, zealous, professional social workers, committed to the cause of child rights, who on one hand act as a bridge between children, care staff, mentors and the other major stakeholders; on the other hand they are responsible for the legal compliances and effective functioning of Udayan Ghars.

MENTAL HEALTH PROFESSIONALS

The Mental Health Programme is headed by a Child and Adolescent Psychiatrist, who, along with our social workers and mentors, and a team of part-time psychologists and counsellors for individual homes, work with our children and care staff to ensure their psychological wellbeing.

VOLUNTEERS & DONORS

As an outstanding testimony to Udayan Care's conviction in collective action towards restoring Child Rights, Udayan Ghars enable great civil society participation. Medical experts, who tend to our children; schools and educational institutes, which provide quality education to our children; and volunteers, in India and from across the world, become immeasurable resource in helping us shape our children into responsible citizens and by bringing their unique and different capacities, help us improve our functioning.

UDAYAN GHARS- ITS UNIQUE ASPECTS

MENTAL HEALTH PROGRAMME

Most of the children coming to Udayan Ghars have faced traumatic experiences before coming into our care. In most of the cases, children have faced various forms of deprivation, the most important being the absence of an intimate, consistent interaction with an adult figure, individual care, attention, love, warmth and security. Lack of these causes children to have major trust and confidence issues. A group of psychologists and counselors constantly work with our children to ensure their well-being. Dr Deepak Gupta, Child and Adolescent Psychiatrist, heading our mental Health programme, interacts regularly with the children, staff and mentor parents to create awareness regarding the mental health concerns of the children, as well as plans with the team the ways of dealing with them. Dr. Monisha C .Nayar-Akhtar, a U.S. based Psychotherapist and Psychoanalyst, guides our team on the best plan of action for our children's development and how an improved environment can positively impact their functioning. Skype sessions are conducted with Ms. Helen Lenga, a psychologist from Australia, an expert in trauma and attachment, to seek suggestions on difficult cases.



EDUCATION & VOCATIONAL TRAINING

Quality education is an important component of each child's development at Udayan Care. The children not only receive best care at home but also receive the best education and are enrolled in the top educational institutions in the city. Children mostly come to us with little or no educational background, so to put life back onto the track, they are home tutored first and then admitted in the schools. Children are exposed to different vocational trainings also as per their talent and aptitude.




HEALTH CARE

A child, when transferred to Udayan Care, is screened for medical needs within 24 hours of arrival. All the children go through monthly and quarterly checkups and their inoculations and medical needs are regularly taken care of by our partner doctors and hospitals with regular follow ups.



HOW UDAYAN GHARS WORK?



PERMANENT HOMES

It is our constant effort that children do not face instability in their environment once again. Our partner ASOS Foundation this year too has supported us in our endeavor by supporting construction of a permanent place of residence for the children in Kurukshetra, Haryana, after helping us build a Girls Home in NOIDA last year! A place which the children can call Home! Construction continues for our second new ASOS Udayan Ghar in Kurukshetra.



MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE & CHILDREN'S COMMITTEES

Each of our 13 homes have Children's Committees and Management Committees in place, which meet as per schedule and gain a lot of participation from our children to improve the functioning of our Homes.

INTERNAL COMMITTEES

Udayan Care has constituted a number of committees to address issues in a standardized, systematic and consistent manner, especially related to children's 'Health', 'Education', 'After care' and 'Alumni' needs. The committees are participatory, where the mentor parents, social workers along with selected members from civil society and some alumnae youth deliberate and make decisions together to refine and enhance the functioning of the Ghars.



BI-ANNUAL AUDITS

An internal bi-annual audit system, to review our Homes, their functioning, legal aspects and proper documentation, was developed and constituted in 2014 internally, and is found to be very useful in understanding the best practices and gaps in the functioning of the Ghars. A team of two members visits each ghar and along with the staff reviews and checks, and provides guidance for corrective measures.

RESEARCH STUDIES

Forever wanting to improve its functioning and to understand the children's perspectives, Udayan Care continuously organizes research studies into its own system and brings back our learnings into our system:

1. A LONGITUDINAL STUDY TO ASSESS THE NEEDS OF THE CHILDREN IN CARE (ANCC)

This longitudinal study is an investigative analysis of the met and unmet needs of children from their own point of view. The questionnaire of this study is a self-made tool with 29 questions, developed in 2011, in accordance to the parameters covering 'basic fundamental needs', 'emotional needs', 'interpersonal needs' and the 'educational needs' of the children with a 4 point rating scale. The methodology used is convenient purposive sampling of children between 10-18 years of age who have lived a minimum of 6 months at the Udayan Ghars.

The 5 years data has been recently analyzed and the abstract for a paper presentation is accepted by the 6th Conference for the International Society for Child Indicators at Montreal, Canada, to be held on June 30, 2017.



2. MENTAL AND PHYSICAL HEALTH OF OVCS IN RESIDENTIAL CARE

This collaborative, longitudinal study (since 2013) is in collaboration with the Public Health Department of Duke University, USA, where the physical and mental health outcomes of orphaned and separated children, living at Udayan Care, are assessed annually, done on the basis of age and gender characteristics. The data is collected over a period of two months in summers since 2014 annually, on specifically measured peer and guardian attachment, self-concept, ego-resiliency, and trauma and depression symptoms.

Every year, four students from Duke University conduct one-on-one interviews with children, and now also with our young people, as well as care staff, assisted by Indian interns. The annual data is analysed and the results are ploughed back into our system, so that no area of care goes neglected.

3. REMEDIATION OF COGNITION IN KIDS TO OVERCOME NEGLECT (ROCK ON)

Neglect during childhood years negatively impacts brain developmental and cognitive abilities, which in turn profoundly influence the child's all around physical and mental health, their ability to control emotions and impulses in behavior and their achievements in school. This societal tragedy of child neglect is a serious public health concern worldwide and this huge need for intervention for pre-teen and teenage children compelled Dr. Jyoti Mishra at University of California to develop the ROCK-ON training programme as a cognitive enrichment tool.

This study is a collaboration between Udayan Care, Dr. Jyoti Mishra, Department of Neurology, University of California and Dr. Rajesh Sagar, Department of Psychiatry, AIIMS, New Delhi.

A five day-residential summer camp was organized where over 170 children from all the 13 Udayan Ghars participated. Udayan Ghar Family comes together for 5 days. Zumba sessions, Magic Shows, theatre, workshops, various competitions were organized to keep the children engaged.



TWO DAYS RESIDENTIAL SCIENCE CAMP – 4TH & 5TH JANUARY '17

Through great efforts of one of the alumni's of Udayan Shalini Fellowship Programme, Darshana Joshi, currently studying for her PhD programme in Cambridge, this workshop titled 'It's a Materials World' was conducted at Udayan Ghar for the children. A group of Indian doctoral students and research professionals from around the globe came together at Jagshanti Home, Greater Noida to intrigue and motivate young students in the fields of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics. This workshop was conducted by VIGYANshaala (Vision India GenY: Applied Sciences Network).

WINTER CARNIVAL – 6TH JANUARY '17

This year too CPM India and Khushiyon Ki Gaadi partnered with us to celebrate "Winter Carnival". Delicious eats, exciting games, beautiful décor, music and artificial snow fall to give a chilling feel was all set at the venue, Jagshanti Udayan Ghar for Girls, Greater Noida. Children and staff across different Udayan Ghars came together to enjoy the event. Major attraction of the event had been the Udayan Care Talent Hunt Show that drew in huge participation of children showcasing their singing and dancing talents. 
ARTS TRAININGS & EXPOSURE

On 24th March 2016, six children from Udayan Ghars participated in a year-long musical tour across the United States of America. The tour provided incredible opportunities for them, both in terms of learning and fun.

Matsiko Children's Choir encourages underserved children from different countries to share their lives and culture through songs and dance. Matsiko, a Ugandan word for "hope", and a choir programme of the International Children's Network (ICN), based in Seattle, USA, spreads hope and cheer, in these annual tours across USA.



LIFE SKILLS AND CAPACITY BUILDING TRAINING

While taking care of needs of the children, Udayan Care also ensures that the Ghar team attends regular meetings and capacity building workshops to foster and hone skills that meet our children's needs. The workshops help the team, as well as children too, to develop mutual trust and create a loving, non-threatening and non-judgmental environment for our children while addressing issues like medical care, personal hygiene, food, physical and emotional security and restoring children's self-esteem/worth and broken attachment and trauma issues.

This year, 34 workshops were conducted to cater to the psycho-social needs and over all development of children, covering a wide range of topics like —Emotional and Behavioral Development, Empowerment of Adolescent Programme, Unmet Emotional Needs, Life Skills, Sexuality and Reproductive Health, Effective Communication, etc.

Being groomed by the Udayan Ghar team, she soon became an extrovert, less participative, and developed high self-esteem. Presently, enrolled in Modern School, Vasant Vihar, in class X, she has found her passion in football since she was in the 3rd standard and since then has been unstoppable. Today, she plays at state and national level in the under 19 team. Her innumerable trophies, medals and certificates adorn the walls of the home. She also played at the Doon Cup by Delhi Soccer Association as part of CBSE interschool competition.

In her school's annual function this year, she was honored as "Outstanding performer" in the field of sports. Apart from football, Marjeena plays cricket and has an upper hand in art and craft and has interest in cooking.



NAME : SHIVAM, AGE : 10 yrs.
DATE OF JOINING US : 04th January 2013

Shivam had been through a disturbing past. Shivam was found at a Railway Station at the age of 5, being exploited by an unscrupulous person and was rescued by a worker of Railways. He was then transferred to Udayan Care in 2007 by the orders of the CWC for long term care and protection.

Being provided with warmth and love in the Ghar family, he started showing improvements in his self-grooming, personal hygiene and skills to carry out day to day activities. Shivam gained confidence and self esteem and was soon enrolled in a reputed English medium school.

In March, 2016, Shivam got an amazing opportunity to be a part Matsiko World Orphan Choir, formed by International Children's Network based in Seattle USA. It was a 10 month journey, he, along with children from other countries, travelled and performed in different parts of America.





Aftercare Programme is the key pillar in the delivery of rehabilitative services for young adults coming out of care system. Gradual and supported transition out of institutionalized settings are the keys to ensure a smooth adjustment from dependence to semi-dependence to complete independence.

The transition period from childhood to an independent adulthood is fraught with dangers if these now young adults do not get required guidance and support. The young adults are vulnerable to land into various serious problems like unemployment, psychological stress, drug abuse, physical and mental illness, homelessness and dependency, if they are not supported, guided and counselled.

Udayan Care's Aftercare Programme is a transit between life at Care Home and life as an independent adult in the real society. It is a much needed effort in providing young adults with the opportunity to learn living independently, yet get supported under the care, security and warmth of Udayan Care family. The programme aims at preparing young adults, just coming out of Udayan Ghars, for life outside Udayan Ghars, by educating and training them for all sorts of challenges life throws. Our After care young adults live in our two After care facilities at Gurugram and Greater Noida. Some young adults also reside in hostels, PGs and rented accommodations.

Udayan Care in its Aftercare Programme provides secure spaces, financial support for professional, vocational education, trainings in life skills, about alcohol and drug problems, therapies for mental health crises, advice on financial literacy, employment and job readiness, and trainings in independent living.

Even after the youth leave our Aftercare services, our ties continue, and these young adults become our Alumni and are further assisted in getting married, or a job change, etc.

Aftercare is the final preparatory stage for young persons, during which they are provided with following services

- Counseling
- Career Guidance
- Educational Support
- Training in Skills
- Residential Support
- Physical Health
- Help with internships and gainful employment
- Finding accommodation and setting them up



OBJECTIVES OF UDAYAN CARE AFTERCARE SERVICES

- 1 To enable young adults of the Udayan Ghar Programme for transition from institutional to independent living through continued education, training, livelihood assistance, mental health inputs and a strong sense of personal identity.
- 2 To ease the stress of the young adults transitioning from the Ghar Programme when only in 10+2 or when nearing the age of 18 years.
- 3 To help them to avoid pitfalls that so many of their peer group encounter, such as alcohol and drug problems, mental health crises, credit trouble, unemployment, homelessness and to provide them counseling and trainings in life skills and independent living
- 4 To engage stakeholders with like-minded vision from civil society to join hands and support in various capacities to manage and monitor Udayan Care After care Facilities and mentor the young adults

A recent study has been developed into a full-fledged paper, abstract for which, as a poster presentation, is accepted at the upcoming world Congress on 'Family Law and Child Rights' at Dublin in June 2017. The poster will showcase the effectiveness of Udayan Care's After care programme that effectively uses the ecological developmental framework and our youth's satisfaction levels from our services, aimed at making them become confident, independent and resilient young adults.

NAME : POOJA, AGE : 25 yrs.
DATE OF JOINING US : 18th May 2002

Pooja had lost both her parents and was just eleven years old when she was handed over to Udayan Care by her aunt. Nurtured by our Udayan Ghar team consisting of mentor parents, social workers and, carestaff, Pooja started developing a sense of trust, bonding and security. The caring, nonjudgmental and loving environment provided by the Udayan Care family helped her grow into a sincere, hardworking, and cheerful girl. Pooja pursued her BSW from Galgotias University. Her belief in herself was reinforced by motivation from her mentor father and she is now working successfully in Genpact. She is one of our brightest stars adorning our Udayan sky!



NAME : SHAALU, AGE : 22 yrs.
DATE OF JOINING US : 2nd June 2004

Shalu, along with her four sisters, came to Udayan Care on orders of CWC in 2004 after their mother expired and their father was unable to take care of the children due to his ill health. She passed class X with 9-CGPA from the prestigious Sagar School, a boarding school at Alwar, Rajasthan. After this she joined class 11 in Delhi Public School Greater Noida, and scored 88.4 % in class-XII from CBSE Board. Post her schooling, Shalu joined B.Pharm from Galgotias University.

NAME : PRAKASH, AGE : 22 yrs.
DATE OF JOINING US : 12nd June 2004

Loss of parents, exploitation at the hands of the guardian was what compelled Prakash to go through early childhood trauma.

On recommendations of a concerned citizen, Prakash was rehabilitated to a child care institution but, the setup there was not conducive enough to cater to his care, protection and development.

Prakash was then transferred to Udayan Care, where he was provided with the required love, care, protection and opportunities to grow and develop.

Prakash has now grown into a fine young man, who is composed, mature, intelligent, hardworking and compassionate. Aspiring to become an engineer, Prakash completed his B.

Tech in Civil Engineering from Hi Tech Engineering College with an outstanding score of 78%

and is now working in a prestigious construction company.

Prakash is a repository of talent, character and is definitely a source of inspiration for others.

- In India, girls' education is often considered the lowest priority, in particular girl's higher education. Gender discrimination, poverty and cultural attitudes prevent millions of girls from weaker sections of society to get an equal opportunity to continue their education and economically empower themselves and their families
- Although 96% of girls enroll in primary school, only **1 of out of every 100 girls** reaches a secondary level of education. In urban areas, **out of 1,000 girls, only 14 reach Class 12** according to the World of India's Girls, a study formulated by a six-member team of Tata Institute of Social Sciences (TISS) in 2014.
- According to current transition rates, a girl who enters her final year of primary education (typically Class V) still **only has a 54% chance of even starting Class XI**.
- The highest percentage of girls drops out between Class X and Class XI. **Only 68%** of girls who enter Class X move on to Class XI (NUEPA 2015). Currently, **out of every 100 graduates, only 38 are women** (Census 2011), thus only 9.11% of girls have access to higher education.
- According to the Census 2011 figures for recent marriages, **1 in 6 girls** are married under the age of 18!

UDAYAN SHALINI FELLOWSHIP PROGRAMME

To provide mentoring and support to disadvantaged girls in order to transform them into dignified and independent women



The Udayan Shalini Fellowship (USF) started in 2002 in Delhi with just 72 girls. The aim was to support girls from economically weaker sections, to study beyond matriculation by enrolling themselves in regular higher secondary, graduation programs or relevant vocational training programs.

HOW USF WORKS

At Udayan Care we believe in maximizing impact through long term intervention. Thus, we support our Shalinis in the course of their entire journey from Class XI to completion of graduation or vocational programmes. USF is not just a scholarship programme, but it aims to nurture every aspect of a Shalini's development. Through workshops, multi-day residential camps, mentoring sessions, Shalinis are taught leadership qualities, life skills and personality development. Advice on career options form an important aspect of the fellowship. Moreover, to instill a desire to give back to society, it is mandatory for Shalinis to perform 50 hours of social work. The success stories of Shalinis are innumerable. Over the years, strong, independent and empowered Shalinis have made us proud.



The programme has four major objectives :



To provide financial support to deserving yet economically deprived girl students to enable them to pursue higher education



To provide individual attention, counselling and grooming through mentoring to ensure their overall personality development



To provide opportunity to widen their horizon of knowledge about various fields like career choices, social issues and personality development.



To engrain a feeling of 'giving back' in our fellows so that they become social responsible citizens of the society

SECRET TO SUCCESS: MENTORS

A good mentor is someone each one of us needs, but few are lucky to find one in a lifetime. Thus, we make sure that all our Shalinis don't miss the opportunity of right guidance.



We connect our Shalinis to mentors, usually senior educators, and corporate employees, who guide them through various issues — be it choosing the right subject in college, enduring stress, or dealing with family related issues, or preparing oneself for a job. In addition, senior Shalinis are encouraged to become mentors themselves, helping their juniors as Mentor Didis and becoming their role models and friends.


CELEBRATING THE PAST WHILE EMBRACING THE FUTURE!

MULTI-LEVEL ENGAGEMENT WITH OUR SHALINIS ACROSS CHAPTERS





ENSURING QUALITY

EXPOSURE VISIT : GENPACT (NOIDA)


On 23rd December, 2016, nine fellows were invited by Genpact to present the prestigious 'Best Performers Awards' to their employees.


MENTOR MENTEE MEET

Bringing technology and skill development closer to the underserved and improving their livelihood opportunities



OVERVIEW

Udayan Care's Information Technology programme was set up in 2004 at the Greater Noida Udayan Care Centre. What started as one centre, C.R.E.A.T.E (Centre for Rehabilitation, Education and Thought Enrichment), has now expanded to 8 centres, spread across 3 states (with 2 new centres started this year)! The program's primary objective is to impart IT skills to disadvantaged sections of densely populated clusters of slums, resettlement colonies, and other low income colonies. It particularly targets underprivileged youth (especially women).



PROGRAM VISION

To broaden the horizons and bring IT closer to the lives of underserved rural and urban communities in Delhi and NCR, and thus empower them for greater job prospects.



TARGET GROUP AND REACH

Poor urban slum communities, especially women, adolescent, children of Delhi and NCR

- Selection and enrollment of trainees on subsidized fees
- Training in job specific courses as well as basic computer courses
- Job shadow and internship opportunities for trained students

NEW INITIATIVES IN 2016-17

IT centre in Bhangel

In the month of August 2016, a new center was set up in Bhangel, Noida. Hilton Engineers Pvt Ltd supported us to spread and make the community aware about the information technology program.



INTERNET LITERACY PROGRAMME (TIE UP WITH PROGRESSIVE PROGRAMMING)

In the month of June, Udayan Care IT program collaborated with Progressive Programming, a US based organization, working with underprivileged youth on computer education and programming skills. Trainers at the centers were trained by the Progressive Programming team for courses on internet. The course was initiated from the East Vinod Nagar centre with 5 dedicated students engaged with internet literacy course for 3 months.

As part of our constant endeavor to deliver the best preparation for employment, we also focus on soft skills such as English communication at our centres. 80 of our students were given the opportunity to study English at Inlingua at South Ex and Nirman Vihar Centres, Amrit Corp Ltd and Amrit CSR Foundation supported us for the same.

OUR METHODOLOGY



WORKSHOPS & TRAININGS

FINANCIAL LITERACY WORKSHOPS

Financial literacy training is part of the job specific course curriculum which helps students to understand and manage basic accounts. During their sessions, our volunteers shared their expertise with students on topics like "Employment and Earnings", "Savings", "Spending" and "Borrowing".

"CRAZY CRAFT WORKSHOP"

Udayan Care endeavors to provide creative environment to the IT students. From time to time we have conducted creative and meaningful workshops for students; making them more aware and ardent towards this field.



CAREER COUNSELING WORKSHOP - TEXT 100

For holistic development of students, external experts from relevant industries are regularly engaged for facilitation. Text 100 is working as a global integrated communications agency, which connected with the IT program and taught 80 students through role play activity, group discussion, and general question answer round, talk about likes and dislikes, etc. These sessions help the students to develop good communication skills.



UDAYAN CARE MEDIA CENTER

Udayan Care Youth Media Centre started under the Youth Leadership Program with the objective to use youth voices and digital media for social change in communities. This project started with the kind support of American India Foundation in our West Vinod Nagar IT center. Youth Voices programme promote digital media and arts as the core component of youth learning and education and promotes youth leadership. 43 students completed their training under of Youth Voices Programme; they have created 14 meaningful media.

EXPOSURE VISITS

During the financial year of 2016-17, seven meaningful exposure visits for the IT students were organized.

- Students were given exposure to India International Trade Fair(IITF) to understand Digital India theme;
- Modern Art Gallery to understand use of colours and designing;
- Hauz Khas Village to understand usage of fashion and designing;
- Book fair at Pragati Maidaan
- Also given exposure to visual communication material, taking creative ideas, selection of colors sense, which in turn would help them to make best designs for their portfolios.

WORLD ENVIRONMENT DAY


World Environment Day is conducted every year on 5th June to raise environmental awareness and take positive action towards protecting nature and the planet Earth.

ABOUT THE PROGRAMME

The Skill Center was set up in the same compound as our Jagshanti Udayan Ghar in Greater Noida, to teach creative skills to our young Udayan Care women who will not achieve the required grades for a college education as well as to those women living in the community, who would find it hard to learn a skill in a formal institute. We offer courses that are not taught in other vocational training centers thus giving our students an edge over others and enabling them to find an exciting career and fulfilling Udayan Care's mission.



Since its inception in 2003, with just one Stitching course, we now have:-



OBJECTIVES AND OUTCOMES

Ascending to financial independence

Ascending to financial independence whilst we wish the Center to become economically sustainable, we consider the measure of success to be the number of women who have been able to move from a 'hand to mouth' existence to one of self-reliance thus enabling them to provide for their families. We also provide adult literacy courses for those women who never had any formal schooling.

WOMEN WITH SHINING PERSONALITIES

Our team prides itself on teaching etiquette in the workplace and personal grooming. We show them how to look after their health by conducting five minute exercise breaks every hour to prevent body aches and pains from sitting for long stretches. We encourage inter-departmental events and training sessions where all the students learn organizational skills and learn to bond with each other.

PROVIDING A MARKETING PLATFORM

We believe that a self-supporting model is the most effective and are thus committed to creating exclusive products to create employment for women from underprivileged communities as well as generating funds for Udayan Care and advancing the center towards self-sustenance. These products are sold under the label of 'Sukriti'. We also ensure that these women learn the ethical practices of fair trade.

WHAT SETS US APART

A VARIETY OF COURSES

Students can choose from a wide range of courses such as Tailoring, Beauty Therapy, Paper Craft, Enamel Work, Beaded Jewelry, China Painting, Block Printing, Digital Pattern Making, Graphic and Textile Design with plans to include Pottery, Photography and Cookery in the near future. Due to the variety of courses, we are able to produce a wide range of products for sale such as table and bed linen, decorated bone china, children's and ladies garments, earrings, necklaces and bracelets from enamel and bead work, silver and semi-precious stones. Our unique packaging is developed in our Paper Craft Studio. Apart from setting up their own small businesses, our students can find employment opportunities in Export Houses, Advertising Agencies, Beauty Salons and Art Departments of Schools.

PLAYROOM FOR WORKING MOTHERS' CHILDREN

Established in May 2015, the Day Care Center offers a secure and fun environment for the children of our women trainees and staff.

FREQUENT WORKSHOPS AND ACTIVITIES FOR ALL STUDENTS AND STAFF

- **Pottery Workshop:** We endeavor to provide activities for all our staff and students. A visiting expert, Priya Sundaravalli, taught our women moulded pottery.
- **The Art Reach Exhibition at the Kiran Nader Museum, South Delhi:** The production ladies of our Skill Center had framed 18 scroll paintings made by our Udayan Care children in workshops conducted by ART REACH under the guidance of Vandana Kothari. The effort of mounting the paintings took a lot of time as it involved selecting fabric to match the paintings, painstakingly sewing them, scouting for round wooden rods to hold the scrolls etc. The paintings along with other artwork created by our children were displayed at the Kiran Nader Museum in the Metropolitan shopping mall in Saket, South Delhi in May 2017.



On 1st June we organised a trip for our Sewing ladies and their trainer, Kusum, to visit the Museum and see for themselves where their work was being displayed. They were so enthusiastic and excited about the outing that they turned up to the center on the dot. Afterwards, they were asked whether they enjoyed the trip and this is what they had to say :-

- **India's 70th Independence Day celebrations:** Our staff and students are encouraged to organize events themselves. India's 71st Independence Day was celebrated with beautiful dances and many students gave solo performances in song and dance. Guests were also treated to snacks Ethical practices and Staff Well-being We train our staff in entrepreneurship and fair trade practices. We also ensure their well-being by providing five-minute sessions of arm and neck exercises every hour.

Pooja Devi

Pooja joined our sewing center in 2016, pursuing the 6 month stitching course affiliated to Usha International whilst still in school, studying for her Class 10 Board exams. Due to financial constraints, she was not able to continue in school so joined the Skill Center Production Unit in April, 2017 as an apprentice. She is a very sincere worker and always comes to work on time. Her small salary, together with that of her father, who is a gardener, supports a family of seven. She is the eldest of 5 girls, the youngest being just 2 ½ years old.

Now that she is bringing a regular income home, her father has allowed her to pursue her 12th standard from Open University in the Science stream. Her dream is to study further and make a brighter future for herself and her family.



Sangeeta

Sangeeta was married off at an early age to a man who is mentally unstable and her family only found out when it was too late. She could only study to the ninth standard but was able to attend Udayan Care's Beauty Training course, after which she now earns a meagre amount by taking clients in her home. Her husband is constantly on medication and she has to regularly travel long distances with him to get his medicines. Since her husband is not in a position to work, she is the sole bread winner and is currently dependent on help from her own family. Despite this situation, she ensures that her three children (all under 10 years) attend school. She has now been appointed as a part-time assistant trainer in the Beauty School.



Madhubala

Madhubala has been working in our Sewing Production Unit since 2016 and is a valued member of our team. The quality of her work has improved to such an extent that we were declared the winners of the Australian INJALAK competition to design and create a garment made from the beautiful silk fabric which is hand printed in original Aboriginal designs. The zero-waste pattern was designed by the young Australian designer, MandishKalsi, shown modelling the garment.

ADVOCACY



ABOUT OUR ADVOCACY EFFORTS

Our advocacy work is focused on the rights of children without parental care (CWPC), which constitutes about 31 million children in India. (UNICEF 2009). We work to ensure that all CWPC are safe and protected and their rights to equality, survival, quality education, nutrition, health, opportunities and livelihood are upheld and secured.

Udayan Care is not only a service provider for children without parental care but also an active advocate and voice for such children, working with Government and civil society to promote policy and practice care reforms in the area of Alternative Care. Our core advocacy efforts constitute of the following :

- Influencing policy and practice through regular persuasive and consistent methods such as seminars and consultations on different niche aspects of Alternative Care,
- Research and Publications on related issues,
- Training and Capacity Building of stakeholders for improving standards of care in Alternative Care practices,
- Networking and membership in appropriate and relevant child rights bodies and processes.

ADVOCACY

Advocating child rights with citizens, civil society organisations and policy makers and building capacities at all levels



OVERVIEW OF 2016-17

This year, our advocacy efforts took a momentum leap towards a focused strategic approach in addressing issues of Alternative Care for children, not only in India but also in South Asia. The year 2016-17 was full of action to not only serve as quality service providers on various issues around child and youth care but also as an active advocate, working closely with Government and other Non- Governmental agencies, networks and alliances to raise niche issues in Alternative Care in India. We have strengthened our advocacy efforts to bring an increased focus on issues such as trauma-informed care, something of its first kind to have ever been held in India. The continued publication of our international journal on Alternative Care, 'Institutionalised Children- Explorations and Beyond' (ICEB), focusing on South Asia, entered into its third successful year, establishing itself as a much sought after and read publication amongst stakeholders.


Publication and growth of 'Institutionalised Children: Explorations and Beyond', (ICEB), our academic journal

TRAINING AND CAPACITY BUILDING OF STAKEHOLDERS

A total of six training programmes (3 days each) were organized on Standards of Care and Sensitization of House Father/House Mother, Cook, Security personnel and Care Staff at various child care centres operated by the Department of Women & Child Development, Delhi. Besides, a 3 day training workshop was held from 22nd to 24th August 2016 at Gwalior by the WCD GWALIOR in collaboration with UNICEF for officials working with children at CCI. A one-day training on Standards of Care as per J & K Juvenile Justice Act at Ramban in Jammu and Kashmir was held on 22nd December, 2016.



Like previous years, we continued our efforts of networking and positioning issues on child and youth care with Govt bodies by participating in networks and coalitions such as India Alliance for Child Rights and the National Action Coordination Group of Delhi. Dr Kiran Modi also joined the Board of CYC-Net: an international organisation working on child and youth care issues. We were part of the NCPCC Core group to develop a training manual for caregivers on issues of mental health of children.

WHAT MAKES US DIFFERENT?

- We strategically choose the most niche issues in child and youth care to be deliberated upon. For example, in 2016, for the first time ever, we convened a stakeholders brainstorming meeting to develop a common understanding of trauma informed care approach while caring for children without parental care
- We continuously strive to research and gather evidence to gain insights into our own work on child and youth care and evolve methods to improving and upgrading our standards of care. For example, the QANCC effort was initiated to include children's voices into our care plans and after 6 years of longitudinal data, we have gained deep insights into subjective wellbeing of children in our group homes.
- We take pride in the fact that our uniqueness was recognized by the UN Committee on Child Rights Convention, (CRC) in 2012, in the following words: 'A few attempts have been made by NGOs such as Udayan Care (a Delhi-based NGO) to promote group foster-care model, providing long-term residential care for orphaned and abandoned children above six years of age'. (at page 90)

CONCLUSION

Advocacy remains a part of the mission and organisational agenda. While most of our advocacy efforts are time intensive and process driven, these initiatives always have a direct and indirect impact on policy, legislations and practices on child and youth care in India as well as South Asia. They go a long way in enhancing the capacities of all players through a continued learning and cross sharing process, thereby making actors better equipped to take care and protect vulnerable children and youth.

HIGH LIGHTS OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Basis of Accounting

The financials have been prepared under the historical cost conventional and accrual method. Income and expenses are accounted on the basis of Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) and practices and Accounting Standards (AS) issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India for NGOs wherever applicable, except where otherwise stated.

Financial performance from a bird's eye view

The income of the year has been segregated as Restricted Funds and Un-restricted funds as per the guidelines issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI). The Restricted funds are the funds given by different agencies for a specific task for specific projects however the Un-restricted funds are General donation, Interest Income, Miscellaneous Income etc. There was an unspent balance of Rs. 4.60 Cr. as Restricted fund which was brought forward from 2015-16 belongs to various projects and identified as a liability in books.

In the year 2016-17, while looking at the financial performance of the Trust, there is a decrease in Income to the tune of Rs. 2.83 crores by way of donations and Grants from all sources. This is because in the last financial year (2015-16) for purchasing a property at Kolkata for its chapter office and to have a training center for the Udayan Shalinies Fellowship Programme, the Kolkata chapter has raised Rs. 3.10 Cr for the said project. Since it was a onetime donation, the income was comparatively reduced to Rs. 13.55 cr this year from Rs.16.39 Cr.

However on the other side, the Revenue Expenditure of the organization has been increased from Rs. 7.57 Cr to Rs. 9.09 Cr. An increase of Rs. 1.52 Cr which is 20% more than the previous year. The increase in the fixed assets have not been considered in the above figures. In this year, the increase in Fixed Assets was Rs. 3.81 Cr whereas in the previous year it was Rs. 4.96 Cr. The reasons for such a huge amount Assets are, this year we have purchased a piece of land for constructing a habitat for the girl children at Kurukshetra, (Haryana) with the support of ASOS Foundation (UK) and a building is under construction there. Moreover we have entered into an agreement with a landlord for purchasing a piece of land in Delhi for constructing an office building for Udayan Care. A sum of Rs. 1.05 Cr has been paid to them as advance which was also taken into account of the addition of Assets. Overall if we consider the money spent on all activities including acquiring Assets, the total expenditure for all activities was Rs. 12.89 Cr. which is 2.9% more than the previous year.




Another significant factor is that, out of the income received for the year Rs. 11.52 Cr (the Corpus Fund received is not considered here as Income as it is not meant for this year), we have spent Rs. 12.89 Cr. Resulted in taking out Rs. 1.37 Cr from the previous years' accumulated funds comprising of Rs. 1.02 Cr from the Restricted funds and Rs. 0.35 Cr from the Unrestricted funds or General Reserve. The positive factor of the over expenditure is that, ultimately this has helped us in bringing down the liability of Restricted fund from Rs. 4.60 Cr to Rs. 3.59 Cr.

Since the year 2015-16 was a one odd case in the case of one time donations for the specific project of purchasing the Office complex cum training center for the Udayan Shalinies Programme. If we compare the income of the organization with the previous year, i.e. 2014-15, there is an increase of Rs. 2.10 crore in this year.

During the year, the Trust mobilized funds, from various sources with the efforts of Trustees, Board Members, Committee Members and Staff, including getting financial aid from funding agencies, the corporate fraternity, other Trusts and NGOs, besides funds from individuals in India and abroad.

In totality, the financial statements clearly indicate that, the organization is steadily growing financially and programmatically. It is ready to take new challenges and also expand its programmes vertically and horizontally further to other areas as per the 'vision 2020' with the motto of 'Bigger, Better and More' of the organization. It is also a clear indication and evident that the trust of the people at large, particularly, the funding agencies and corporates really trust the TRUST and we can deliver quality services up to the expectations of the donors and also to the deserving folks of the society.


